From the Resident Chaplain

One of the great joys of being a chaplain in the Royal Air Force is that you can find yourself working out of all sorts of buildings. In my ministry I have had churches in barrack blocks, ISO containers, a bandstand, a converted gym and even the occasional purpose built one.

At St Clement Danes my office is located in the tower above the main door, and although I am not saying its cold, it does have a certain Dickensian feel – even though it was

built by Christopher Wren.



So it seems quite odd that we have decamped, for a short while it is true, into a Portakabin on the north side of the curtilage. This is to allow the contractors free access to the church to carry out the necessary re-wiring of the building. It is odd also, to hear people talk about our lovely church as 'the site', but as each day passes we get closer to bringing the building back into use. In fact by the time you read this we will be completing the works and be up and running again.

I'll let you know all the details of the fun we had – with photos in our next issue. Suffice to say we shall be open from Easter, so please call in and see us; you will, as always, be most welcome.

The electrical works

As you know we are carrying out vital electrical works in the church for a short period at the start of 2015. We have chosen that couple of months as the church is traditionally less busy – this is when we normally do most of our planning for the rest of the year.



We are re-wiring the entire building, bringing the electrical supply, switches, sockets, circuit breakers up to 21st century standards. At the same time we are taking the opportunity to replace the fire alarm system which is very old, upgrade the sound system (including a new hearing loop), the CCTV and other minor works. We are improving the lighting, both internally and externally, which will provide us with a considerable cost saving in years to come.

The work is being carried out by a team of experienced contractors who have worked on many major church buildings – so we are in good hands.

The aim is to put in the new electrics in such a way that most people will not even notice the difference; much is being done on a like for like basis, and great care has been taken to ensure any changes are small.

The net result will be a building that is electrically fit for the next fifty years (the structure is reassuringly sound); a building that will be safe for those working and visiting and will be a continuing memorial to those who are commemorated here.

As I said in my introduction to this issue, we will furnish you with a full report in our next bulletin – and by then you will be able to come and see for yourself.



COVER STORY: Bentley Priory Museum

Once Headquarters Fighter Command, Bentley Priory is now a Museum, dedicated to one of the most important narratives of modern history – how the Battle of Britain was won.



Bentley Priory Museum explores how technology, leadership and courage forged victory during the Battle of Britain, enabling Britain's darkest hour to also be her finest hour. The Museum highlights the

contribution and importance of 'The One', Air Chief Marshal Sir Hugh Dowding, 'The Few', the aircrew, and 'The Many', without whose tireless work on the ground victory would not have been possible.

Visitors to the Museum can access these important narratives through an Award Winning audio visual display, engaging displays of medals, paintings and artefacts, and a recreation of a Filter Room - which explores the technology utilised during the Battle of Britain and the importance of the 'Dowding System', the world's first large-scale centralised air defence command and control system.

The new Museum was officially opened in September 2013 in the presence of their Royal Highnesses The Prince of Wales and The Duchess of Cornwall. In its first year, the Museum welcomed nearly 10,000 visitors and is looking forward to

welcoming more visitors in 2015, during the 75th Commemorations of the Battle of Britain.



In addition to individual, group and school visits, the Museum has welcomed visits from a number of serving RAF personnel, often as part of Recruit Training or Force Development Training. In

acknowledgement of past and present service, veterans and HM Forces receive a discount on admission into this spectacular Museum; with entry currently only £5 (adult admission is usually £9). Group tours are available at no additional cost, and are delivered by knowledgeable staff and volunteers.

The Museum is open Monday, Wednesday, Friday and Saturday and on Tuesday and Thursdays for larger group visits.

A programme of events for the 75th Anniversary of the Battle of Britain will be publicised as part of the Museum's new website which will be launched in Spring 2015.

The founders of the Bentley Priory Battle of Britain Trust included Battle of Britain veterans. They wanted to ensure that the important histories of Bentley Priory and the Battle of Britain were not lost. Bentley Priory Museum ensures that this objective is achieved, and this pivotal history is shared.

1. Prayer

The President opened the AGM with a prayer.

2. Apologies

Apologies were noted.

3. Chairman's Opening Remarks

As announced at the last AGM, the Ven Canon Robin Turner and Air Cdre Paul Hughesdon stepped down as President and Chairman of the Friends respectively in 2014, to be replaced by Ven Canon Ray Pentland and Gp Capt Mark Heffron. The new Chairman introduced himself and explained that his principal aims as Chairman would be to: 1) significantly increase the number of Friends from within the serving RAF Personnel cohort and 2) ensure that the Constitution of the Friends dovetailed with the recently revised Objectives of the church Trustees. Committees to take forward these activities had already been formed. The next meeting of the Council of Management (scheduled for January 2015) would provide the first opportunity for these committees to report.

In a recent meeting which the new Chairman had with HRH the Duke of Gloucester, HRH agreed to remain Patron in Chief of the Friends and gave his enthusiastic support for recruiting more currently-serving RAF personnel as Friends, including those of senior rank.

The Chairman thanked all Friends and Council members for their support throughout the past year. He noted that the Friends had given generously to improve church facilities, with over £4,000 worth of grants made over the last year to repair hassocks, replace altar and wedding kneelers, provide a new memorial book and a display cabinet in the crypt, purchase a trolley for folding tables and procure music storage cupboards. Moreover in the coming year, whilst the church is to be closed from late December 2014 to mid-March 2015 for rewiring and other electrical works, the Friends will provide a further £11,000 in grants, over that period, to

replace carpeting and office furniture.

The Patron of the Friends, Air Chf Mshl Sir Andrew Pulford, Chief of Air Staff, apologised for being unable to attend this year's Friends Concert, but sent his best wishes for a successful event.

4. Election of Officers and Council Members

The Chairman thanked members of the Council for their efforts over the past year, expressing particular appreciation for the many years of service to the Friends provided by the former President, Ven Canon Robin Turner, and former Chairman, Air Cdre Paul Hughesdon.

The resolution was seconded by Wg Cdr Bentley and passed unanimously on a show of hands.

5. Minutes of Last Meeting

The minutes of the last AGM (as published in the spring 2014 edition of O&L magazine) were made available and the Chairman asked if there were any questions. There being none, approval was proposed by Wg Cdr Hill, seconded by Mr Collas and passed unanimously on a show of hands.

6. Treasurer's Report

Copies of the Receipts and Payments Account for the year to 30th June 2014 were distributed (see Appendix I).

Receipts for the year to 30th June 2014 totalled £17,880, versus £15,933 for the previous year. Payments were £14,759, against £20,607 last year. The Hon Treasurer detailed the various sources of inflows and outflows. The excess of income over expenditure was £3,122 (reversing a £4,674 shortfall last year) and the year-end bank balance was £66,714, of which £19,218 was ring-fenced as a reserve for Life Membership, leaving £47,496 available to spend.

The Hon Treasurer was pleased to report that difficulties experienced with bank accounts and Gift Aid administration had now been successfully resolved.

Approval of the accounts was proposed by Mr Collas, seconded by Wg Cdr Meyer and passed unanimously on a show of hands.

Approval to dispense with a formal annual audit of the accounts was proposed by Wg Cdr Hill, seconded by Mr Collas and passed unanimously on a show of hands.

7. Membership Secretary's Report

Membership and O&L mailing list records are now maintained by the Church Manager. Most new members join as a result of an association with the books of remembrance in the church.

The following proposal (as published in the autumn 2014 edition of O&L magazine) was made:

'Your Executive Committee has, as directed by the AGM in 2006, reviewed on a two-yearly rolling basis the subscription rates. We commenced our review early in 2014 (for implementation on 1 July 2015) and make the following recommendation for ratification to the 2014 AGM:

'We propose that you agree to increase subscriptions (from 1 July 2015) to £22pa single and £33pa joint, provided both are paid by Direct Debit. At the AGM in 2012 it was decided no longer to accept cheques or standing orders for annual membership and, because of the postage costs and

extra work involved, it was agreed to add an additional £3 to the annual cost of renewals by cheque. We further propose that the £3 additional charge applies to those who wish to continue with cheque and standing order payments.

'We propose no change to the age qualification of 65yrs as agreed for entry to life membership in the 2012 AGM.

'We propose no change to the Life Membership rates which were set at 18 times the annual rate at the 2012 AGM – that is to say £396 single and £594 joint at the above agree rates.'

Approval was proposed by Mrs Jessop, seconded by Mr Holtby and passed unanimously on a show of hands.

With respect to efforts to increase the numbers of Friends who are currently serving in the RAF, Mr Collas enquired whether or not it was possible for RAF payroll to handle subscriptions. The Chairman replied that this had been investigated and the costs would be prohibitive. However, the relevant committee would look into the feasibility of charging currently serving personnel a reduced subscription rate.

8. Any Other Business

Mrs Youle enquired whether the church lavatories would be upgraded as part of the refurbishment works to be undertaken from December to March. The Chairman indicated he would raise the issue at the next church Trustees meeting.

9. Date of Next Meeting

Thursday 26th November 2015 at 4 pm, with the concert to be held at 7pm that evening.

Financial Report to the Annual General Meeting – Accounting Year Ending June 2014

The CC16A, which records the income and expenditure categories on which we report to the Charity Commission at the end of the year, is shown below. The figures are rounded up or down to the nearest whole pound in accordance with Charity Commission guidelines and this rounding can induce errors of addition (usually of £1) within the accounts as displayed. Explanations of key areas are given in the paragraphs below.

Our total income was £17,880 (£15,933 last year) against a budgeted income of £14,800. Total donations for the year exceeded the budget (by 3 times) and reached £5,005, along with a legacy bequest of £1,000. Sales from Christmas cards, ties and other miscellaneous items amounted to £1,293 (£1,482 last year), greater than the £700 budgeted, with the majority of money coming from sales made within the Church; only £108 was received for Christmas Cards. The concert raised £2,404 (£1,991 last year) from ticket sales and £307 from contributions towards refreshments. Bank interest was £179 (£155 last year). Subscription income was lower than the £8,000 budgeted and amounted to £6,908 (£6,183 last year). The sum of £250 (£550 last year) was received from the main Church as Guild contributions from weddings held and £535 (£530 last year) was received from the Easter Service to offset the cost of flowers.

Expenditure for the year was £14,759 (£20,607 last year), slightly under budget. Grants totalling £4,095 (£10,234 last year) were made to the Church for the refurbishment of the kneelers, provision of a new book of remembrance, book cases, storage cupboards and a table trolley for the crypt. Payment for the issues of the O&L, including printing costs, postage and editor fees were just under budget at £4,488 (£4,451 last year). The Concert and Friends Service were within the budget of £3,400 at £3,434 (£3,306 last year) and other costs for the Easter Service flowers amounted to £605 (£537 last year). Bank charges for the running of the BACS system for membership direct debits amounted to £693 (£664 last year). A further £337 was spent on amending the joiners form and subsequent re-printing, with £60 being spent on committee badges, £28

for concert printing and £40 for website design and £65 on the presentation to the outgoing chairman. Expenditure for the year is completed by the purchase of new stocks of ties £594, travel and postage expenses (£216 compared to £332 last year), the Guild (£41 with no expenditure last year) and the AGM expenses (£202 compared to £226 last year).

At the end of the year we had an excess of income over expenditure of £3,122; last year we had the reverse situation having planned to overspend by £4,674. Our Bank Accounts held £66,714 (£63,592 last year) with £47,496 available as free reserves to spend on our charitable activities. During the year your Trustees carried out a further revision on the reserve for the Life Memberships and this has now been recalculated at £19,218 to more accurately reflect our liabilities in this area.

During the year we experienced some difficulties in getting correspondence delivered to us regarding the direct debits which we utilise through HSBC but this is now resolved. Our efforts in approaching Yorkshire Bank to close the account and transfer the monies to Unity Bank were finally successful and we are now in a situation to make better use of electronic banking.

Annual Friends Concert

The Annual Friends' Concert was a resounding success and was superbly supported by the Friends of St Cement Danes, family and friends.



This year we thought we would highlight the organisations that provided the music and who work behind the scenes to make the concert run smoothly and effortlessly. From the Central Band of the Royal Air Force to the Choir of the Central Church of the Royal Air Force and the cadets of 296 (Stoke Newington)

Air Training Corps who provided a smart guard of honour and helped distribute and clear away the refreshments.

The relationship The Friends of St Clement Danes' has with the Central Band of the Royal Air Force is a very special and close one. Without them there would be no concert and we as the audience would not be able to have the privilege of listening to some of the top musicians within the UK.



The Central Band of the Royal Air Force Band played music ranging from Christmas carols to popular classical pieces and finishing, most appropriately, with the RAF March Past. The Band was conducted by Flight Lieutenant Richard Murray, who has been the Director of Music since January 2012. It has boasted a proud and distinguished heritage, music always being a part of military life, since its formation in 1920. In 1922, the Central Band became the first military band to broadcast on BBC Radio and remains the most frequently featured on the airwaves. It is based at RAF Northolt, with a purpose built, state of the art facility. We are especially privileged

that the band performs at the Friends Annual Concert as they are at the forefront of many State Ceremonial events, from 'Changing the Guard' at Buckingham Palace to the National Remembrance Service at the Cenotaph.

They also participate in many high-profile national events, including the Queen's Diamond Jubilee celebrations, the Royal Wedding and the 2012 London Olympics. They maintain a strong international presence with the distinction of being the first outside the USA to be awarded the 'John Philip Sousa Citation for Musical Excellence'. Having featured in International Tattoos in Quebec (2011) and Basel (2014), the band is looking forward to taking a leading role in the 2015 Royal Edinburgh Military Tattoo. Lately the band has represented the British Military for the Queen's Birthday Celebrations in New Delhi, India, and has participated in the Victory Day Parade in Red Square, Moscow, marking the anniversary of Victory in Europe for Allied Forces. Engagements have also been undertaken in other countries around the world, including Holland, Germany, Hungary, Poland, Cyprus, Saudi Arabia, Australia and the USA.

There is, however, another side to the sterling accomplishments of Central Band musicians. As serving members of the Royal Air Force, they support key operational roles in less familiar environments such as Afghanistan, Turkey and the Falkland Islands, with many musicians having served in Operation TELIC (the 2nd Gulf War) in Iraq. The musicians fulfill a diverse range of operational roles, from detainee handling in Afghanistan to driving ambulances in the Falkland Islands. From the concert stage to operational theatres around the globe, Central Band members display (in their conduct and performance) the excellence for which the Royal Air Force has become renowned during its illustrious history.



The Choir of the Central Church of the Royal Air Force always performs to the highest of standards and this concert was no exception.

The Squadron currently has over 40 members and its particular strength is in sports; having dominated disciplines from athletics to football as well as being recognised as one of the highest standards of ATC bands in the London areas since 1950. The aim of the Squadron is to develop in its cadets, through the concept of formal military discipline, a sense of responsibility, confidence, loyalty, determination and motivation. They provide cadets with skills in areas of communication, leadership, planning and teamwork, through a host of practical initiatives centred mainly on sports and adventure training.

All in all, the Annual concert was a great success with record numbers attending, everyone thoroughly enjoyed themselves and it was great to see new and old faces amongst the crowd.

A New Discovery

As most of you reading this will recognise that I have been your Membership Secretary for many years but I am also a Freemason, primarily in my home county of Gloucestershire. About two years ago whilst at St Clement Danes I was asked if there was a St Clement Danes Freemasons Lodge. Knowing about the St Clement Danes Primary School, founded in 1700 and located in Drury Lane and the St Clement Danes Secondary School established in 1862 now located in Chorleywood I was somewhat surprised not to have found out about a St Clement Danes Freemasons Lodge. My naturally enquiring mind led through a 'google' search to discover that there was indeed a St Clement Danes Freemasons Lodge and the search results led me to discover an email address for the Lodge Secretary – some six months later I visited St Clement Danes Lodge to discover that it was established in 1871 some nine years after the Secondary School. Their first 70 years history is inextricable linked with our Church. The first Lodge Chaplain was the rector of St Clement Danes, Rev R J Simpson, as were Church Wardens and other members of the congregation of the then Parish Church. Later another Rector was even more involved in the Lodge from the 1920, or even earlier as he was the Worshipful Master of the Lodge in 1922-23, wrote the music for the Lodge opening and closing and went onto hold Grand Officer Rank with the United Grand Lodge of England.

Unfortunately WWII caused decimation of the Lodge members and of course the reduction of the Church to rubble only to be rebuilt, not so much as a Parish Church but as the Central Church of the RAF. The affinity between the Lodge and the Church seem to have diminished over the last 50 years but now I have also joined the St Clement Danes Freemasons Lodge I feel that we have already started to rebuild that relationship. Three members of the Lodge

and their wives attended our last Friends Concert, and all were amazed at the magnificence of the Church and the entertainment.

The World's Toughest Parish?

When he joined up he was the first ever Reservist Padre; now Giles Legood has become the first RAF Chaplain to receive an operational honour since World War II.



Padre Legood, 46, served four months in Afghanistan in 2013, supporting the staff of the UK Medical Group at Camp Bastion Hospital. He was awarded the MBE for 'giving his all to support the Nation's wounded' and for

his 'unwavering belief in the face of adversity'.

"It was a World away from my civilian parish in Hatfield." said Padre Legood. "I'd swapped a 13th Century church in leafy Hertfordshire for a wooden hut in the sand, the organ was an iPod docking station and our singing was often drowned out by the helicopters flying overhead."

"My pager would go off in a service if casualties were brought into the hospital and I would be there. It was my job to act as a reassuring presence for the staff, to chat to them after the patients went into the operating theatre. Many of them were young and on their first deployment, and they were experiencing things you might never see in a civilian A&E Department."

His belief would be tested during one incident which saw more than 50 civilian and International Security Assistance Force casualties brought into the hospital. “I would say a prayer if there was a death on the operating table and then accompany the staff as they took care of that individual and prepared them for their final journey home. It was a privilege to serve alongside the team at Bastion Hospital, who were regularly exposed to horrific scenes of suffering but worked tirelessly to save lives, whether they were British, Coalition Forces or Afghan.”

Padre Legood was ordained in 1992, becoming a chaplain at the University of London before joining 600 Squadron Royal Auxiliary Air Force in 2004. He transferred to the regular RAF in 2007 and is now The Revd Dr (Wing Commander), Staff Chaplain to the Chaplain-in-Chief at Headquarters Air Command in Buckinghamshire.

“I used to walk past St Clement Danes, the RAF Church in London, and they asked me to cover a Sunday Service. My interest in the military side of service grew from there. I enjoyed the baptisms and weddings, the events that allowed you to speak on an informal basis – you are able to reach people who may not ordinarily attend church services.”

“I would encourage my civilian colleagues to join up. You get to serve at the heart of the institution; you are a part of the life of the Service. You never have to justify your presence. Being a military Padre is all about our core task – direct engagement with people.”

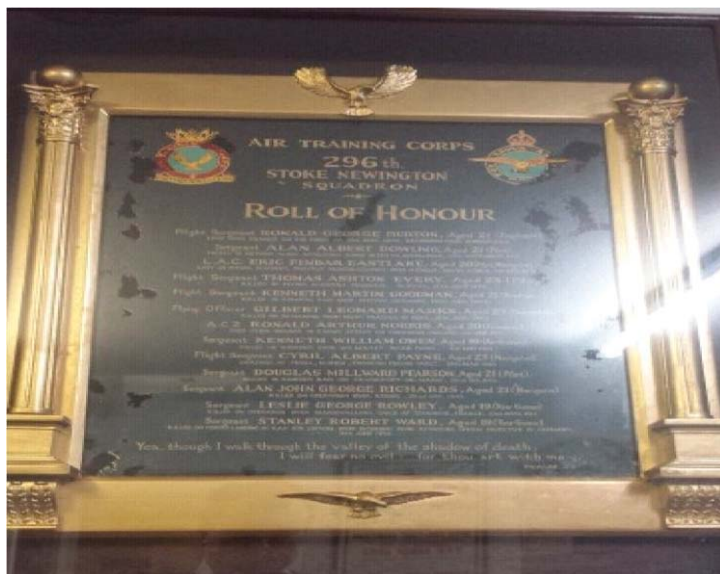

Introducing 296 (Stoke Newington) Squadron Air Training Corps

For those who may not be aware, 296 (Stoke Newington) Squadron Air Training Corps has provided Cadets to form the Carpet Guard for the Friends' Annual Concert for over ten years. This is a prestigious and important occasion for the Squadron as we not only support the Friends but also compliment an ever-decreasing blue foot print of the RAF in London.



Before joining the Air Training Corps I did not realise how much of a sacrifice was made by young men, not much older than me, during WW2. The issue of sacrifice is prominent in the Squadron

as 13 Cadets gave their lives during WW2 and to commemorate this, 13 cherry trees were planted in the surrounding roads, plus a plaque was placed on a wall in Lavell Street, N16. There is also a memorial in the CO's office in the Squadron HQ.

I joined the Squadron in 2011 with high hopes of one day joining the RAF and becoming a fighter pilot (as is the dream of many a young

person). From an early age the RAF has been huge passion that began with my first air show at Biggin Hill.

The Cadets have allowed me to wear the RAF blue beret and to get to know the history and beliefs of the RAF which reflect on the ATC. One of my earliest memories in the Cadets is stepping on a Corporals shoes; I never truly understood why he took it so seriously, until now. I can honestly say that it is the most irritating situation to date to have someone ruin hours of work and polish, as I am sure most people within the services will understand and agree.

For us Remembrance Sunday is one of the most important parades of the year. Our Commanding Officer annually says “Not even death will stop you from coming!” In the weeks prior to the event, nights of drill and uniform sessions are implemented to make sure we have an excellent turn out and can fully honour those who gave the ultimate sacrifice.



Our main parade on is at Bermondsey war memorial for the two minutes silence at 11am. We then travel back to Stoke Newington for a smaller parade, with two minutes silence in the Town Hall Library where

the Local Council War Memorial is situated. This is followed by a slow march past on Lavell Street, where the 13 cherry trees have been planted.



The subject of preparation doesn't stop there. It all starts again for the Friends Annual Concert, with the Central Band of the RAF. It is evenings of polishing shoes and shining brass buckles for the white belts... plus loads of drill practice. This is important

to us, as we support the Friends and promote the RAF, whose commitments are increasing and numbers falling.



The very next day is an early meet for us, as it is a change of uniform so we can make our way down to the Bramley training area for our Annual Christmas Weekend Camp. The weekend consists of leadership

training, expedition training, radio communications and above all is the Christmas Party with a full Christmas roast dinner.

Therefore may I, on behalf of the Cadets and Staff of the Air Training Corps wish you and your families a belated happy Christmas and prosperous New Year.
